

Memory Care Red Flags

What to Watch For During Tours

Not all memory care communities are created equal. This guide highlights warning signs that a memory care community may not provide adequate care, supervision, or dementia-appropriate support. Trust your instincts and keep looking if you see multiple red flags.

Staffing & Training Red Flags

- **△ Vague answers about staffing ratios:** Cannot or will not tell you staff-to-resident numbers
- **△ High staff turnover:** Frequent changes in caregivers or management
- **△ Limited dementia training:** Staff lack specialized training in dementia care and behavioral management
- **△ Stressed or rushed staff:** Caregivers appear overwhelmed, short with residents
- **△ No consistency in assignments:** Different caregivers every day, no relationship building
- **△ No nurse on site:** No clinical oversight or medical monitoring

Environment & Safety Concerns

- **△ Not truly secured:** Exit doors easily opened, no alarm system, residents could wander out
- **△ Institutional feel:** Hospital-like, sterile, not homelike

- **△ Poor lighting:** Dim hallways, shadowy areas that increase confusion
- **△ Cluttered or confusing layout:** Difficult to navigate, no clear sight lines
- **△ Unpleasant odors:** Urine, poor ventilation, lack of cleanliness
- **△ No outdoor space:** Residents cannot safely access fresh air and nature

Care & Supervision Issues

- **△ Residents left alone:** No staff presence in common areas, wandering unsupervised
- **△ Overuse of psychotropic medications:** Chemical restraint rather than behavioral strategies
- **△ Physical restraints:** Use of restraints instead of proper supervision
- **△ Dismissive of behaviors:** Staff call behaviors "attention seeking" or blame the resident
- **△ No individualized care plans:** One-size-fits-all approach to care
- **△ Poor communication with families:** Don't notify about falls, changes, or incidents

Programming & Engagement Red Flags

- **△ Minimal activities:** Residents sitting in front of TV all day
- **△ Not dementia-appropriate:** Activities too complex or not meaningful
- **△ No sensory stimulation:** Lack of music, art, nature, tactile activities
- **△ Staff not engaging:** Caregivers don't interact with residents beyond tasks
- **△ No routine or structure:** Chaotic environment without predictability

Resident Condition Observations

- **△ Residents appear neglected:** Unkempt, dirty clothing, poor grooming
- **△ Agitated or distressed residents:** Frequent yelling, aggression, or visible distress
- **△ Residents calling for help:** Unanswered call lights, residents crying out
- **△ Weight loss or dehydration:** Visible signs residents aren't getting proper nutrition

- **⚠ Pressure sores or injuries:** Signs of inadequate care or supervision

Admission & Financial Red Flags

- **⚠ Will accept anyone:** No assessment of whether they can meet care needs
- **⚠ Pressure to sign quickly:** Rush tactics, limited time to review contract
- **⚠ Unclear pricing:** Cannot explain what is included in base rate vs. extra charges
- **⚠ No refund policy:** Keep full deposit regardless of move-out timing
- **⚠ Frequent rate increases:** History of raising costs without notice

Management & Communication Issues

- **⚠ Defensive or dismissive:** Won't answer questions, get defensive about concerns
- **⚠ No transparency:** Won't share inspection reports, staffing schedules, or incident logs
- **⚠ Recent management changes:** Frequent turnover in leadership
- **⚠ Poor online reviews:** Pattern of complaints about care quality or safety
- **⚠ Won't allow unscheduled visits:** Restrict when you can visit or observe

Critical Red Flags (Walk Away)

- State citations for abuse, neglect, or serious violations
- Cannot demonstrate they can meet your loved one's care needs
- Residents appear frightened of staff
- Evidence of physical or chemical restraint use
- Will not allow you to speak with current residents' families
- Your gut feeling says something is wrong

What Good Memory Care Looks Like

- Staff know residents by name and engage warmly with them
 - Residents appear calm, content, and engaged
 - Routine and structure with flexibility for individual needs
 - Transparent communication about staffing, care, and costs
 - Specialized dementia training for all caregivers
 - Secured environment that feels homelike, not institutional
 - Meaningful activities tailored to residents' abilities and interests
